#### **Festivals and Colours**

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord <sup>23</sup> (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), <sup>24</sup> and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." Luke 2:22-24

During the year, the colours of the hangings in church change from season to season. As I write this we are still in the Christmas period and the colour is white. After Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> February, which is the festival of Presentation of Christ in the Temple, also known as Candlemas, the colour will change to green. Why? The symbolism of this day is complicated. As Candlemas, it celebrates the candles lit to mark the presentation of Jesus in the Temple. This was a Jewish tradition explained in Luke's Gospel which you can see at the start of this letter. The choice of sacrifice is an indication that although the family of Jesus were religiously devout, they were also poor.

This day is also known in the United States as Groundhog Day. Groundhog Day is now celebrated mostly in America but the tradition is an ancient European festival brought to America by the settlers. In the Northern Hemisphere, this date marks the midpoint between the winter solstice in December and the spring equinox in March.

The tradition is that if the groundhog comes out of his burrow and sees his shadow, we'll have six more weeks of winter; if he doesn't see his shadow, it'll be six weeks until spring. It seems to me that this is six of one, and half a dozen of the other.

Either way, this day marks the moment when Spring can be anticipated, and Winter is nearly over.

Which brings me back to the colours in church. Each change marks a moment when there is likely to be a special occasion, or a festival of some sort. But as I have said more than once here, we have lost touch with our festivals, our heritage. These would have been moments when the village would have gathered together, shared food and drink, and the community strengthened. Sadly, we seem these days to lock ourselves away in our homes.

At the recent "Leading our church into growth" lunch meeting we talked about festivals. So look out for events that our church, traditionally the "village church", will be celebrating. If you notice the colours change in church and there has not been an event, you might want to ask why not.

We are still coming through a time when the world we live in is changing fast. The pandemic has forced people who followed the advice to keep apart. Although we still need to take care, it is also time to begin to look out of our burrow, just as the groundhog does, and look around.

Spring is on its way.

#### **Reflected Faith Series: Candlemas**

There are three reasons for this festival, which is held each year on the second of February.

**Firstly,** it's the halfway point between the shortest day and the Spring Equinox, so from that date on the daylight hours get longer.

In pre-Christian times, this day was known as the 'Feast of Lights' and celebrated the increase strength of the life-giving sun as Winter gave way to Spring.

**Secondly,** it's when we remember Mary and Joseph taking their baby Jesus, to the Temple forty days after His birth.

And the third reason? It's directly linked to the name of the feast – Candlemas. It was so named because on that day each year all the candles for the coming year were brought into the church to be blessed at a 'mass'. Remember that candles were important in those days, not only because there were no electric lights; people thought they gave protection against plague and illness and famine.

In many churches on this feast there will be a procession of the whole congregation with lighted candles – often inside the whole building, going into every 'dark' corner. Everyone carries their own lighted candle, which they are encouraged to take home and light there also.

One of the prayers that may be used is this:

Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the universe.

You make our darkness to be light.

For with You is the well of life

and in Your light shall we see light.

#### This month

Christ is often called the 'Light of the World' who came to bring light, hope, and peace into our darkness. Have a think about those places that are dark for you and perhaps you do not like going there or will not go there. Perhaps they are too painful or scary.

Just pause for a short time with a lit candle and imagine Jesus going there for you or with you. Lighting your way. Making it safe. He came to give us life – and life to the full – even in those dark places.


