

## Easter turns the world on its head.

This is being written in Lent, it will be published in early April, and Easter is still two weeks away. Such is the world we live in. I don't know about you, but I have several hobbies, and there are always associated magazines. I have already received April's editions. We live in an impatient word don't we.

But Lent is a time when in church terms, we can take a break, find time to reflect and we can think about what happened on Good Friday and Easter. I wonder if we still feel that Easter turned the world upside down.

As we have been looking at "The Last Week" during the Lent Course, we are discovering much more about the activities of Jesus and his disciples in this time. There are many points of teaching that are often missed, and this learning is challenging our ideas about Jesus, the crucifixion, and the Resurrection. What happened in this week is as relevant to today's society as it was two thousand years ago.

Two thousand years ago, there was a corrupt administration in league with the hostile imperial power. The nation was being led away from the messages contained in what were then known as "the Law and the Prophets". It appears to me that selfishness, greed, injustice and inequality were clearly evident at the heart of the Temple Authorities.

Everyone was expecting the Messiah, the anointed one, to lead them away from this, to forcibly drive out the oppressors. Jesus was not what they were expecting. He turned their world on its head.

These events and issues lie at the very heart of our faith, but in today's society, sadly, Easter simply becomes "another Christian festival" with chocolate and fluffy bunny rabbits.

We look back on the events of Easter through two thousand years of thought and reflection, but does it make a difference? Yes, for many it does, to others it is



At St. Mary's this Easter season we will meet with our fellow Christians on Maundy Thursday in church and at a fellowship meal. On Good Friday I will lead a reflection based on the "Stations of the Cross". This is the process of remembering of the moments from when Jesus was arrested until he was crucified. The last Station, the Resurrection, will wait until Easter Sunday.

Traditionally, on the Saturday before Easter Day, the church will be especially cleaned, the brass and silver will be polished, new candles will be put on the altar ready for Easter Day.

On Easter morning some of us will gather at 5.00am to greet the dawn, and remember that it was the ladies who first discovered the Resurrection. At the first signs of dawn, the new Paschal Candle will be lit from the flames of the brazier and "the light of Christ" will be brought into church.

We will gather at the Easter Garden, and the stone over the tomb will be rolled away.

As you may well have gathered, for me, Easter is the single most important festival of the Christian year, and the Sunrise Service, the most important service of Easter Day.

Each year we are renewed, encouraged, enlivened and challenged at this time.

After the Sunrise Service, there will be a buffet breakfast in the Church Hall.


So begins a new year in the life of our church.



#### My dear Nephew Darren

Consider yourself fortunate that your churchyard consists of no more than a small, paved area, and that keeping it tidy requires ten minutes of picking up discarded takeaway boxes on Sunday morning. Our four acres of grass and randomly placed gravestones absorbs a large portion of the time and energy of half the parish.

By getting different people to adopt sections of the churchyard, the hope was that an element of competition would be introduced; Major Rutherford would never let Admiral Crompton's section look tidier than his and the local farmers would want to show the amateurs that they knew far more about land maintenance.

Sadly, human nature has got in the way – as it invariably does. Miss Timmins has declared her section a nature reserve, so that the cuddly field mice and darling hedgehogs have somewhere to live in. This now means that crossing from her patch to the next feels like crossing from Kew Gardens to the Amazon Rainforest. Two feet high grass and a profusion of dandelions give way to manicured lawn with any weed daring to pop its head above the parapet being beheaded in seconds. Miss T is toying with erecting a fence round her plot, to keep her dear furry friends safe and Sir Horace is threatening to have it electrified, to make sure they do not defile his grass billiard table.

Mr Tremble, a retired health and safety officer, whose well-meaning advice on avoiding accidents is such a burden, is applying to have all the gravestones on his patch levelled, so that no one could be killed by having a fall on them. The fact that this has never happened in 600 years, seems an irrelevance to him. Canon Paul Hardingham considers what the Resurrection achieved.

#### **Christian Basics No 4: What about the Resurrection?**

'Easter is not primarily a comfort, but a challenge. Its message is either the supreme fact in history or else a gigantic hoax.' (CS Lewis).

As we celebrate another Easter, what is the significance of Jesus' resurrection for us? As Paul writes, *'if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins'*. (1 Cor 15:17). What does the New Testament affirm about the resurrection?

It affirms that Jesus' death on the cross was not a defeat but a **victory** over sin, death and Satan, in which we share. 'But God raised Him from the dead, freeing Him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on Him' (Acts 2:24).

It points to our own **bodily resurrection** after death, 'The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable' (1 Cor 15: 42).

It guarantees the **forgiveness** of our sins, *'if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins'* (1 Cor 15:17).

It ensures that we can know the reality of His **risen life** today, '*just as Christ was* raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life' (Rom 6:4).

The story is told of Russia under the Communist regime. A member of the Communist Party addressed a packed audience at length, seeking to discredit the resurrection of Christ. At the end an Orthodox priest rose and asked if he might reply. He was warned that he only had five minutes. *'Five seconds is all I need!'* He turned to the audience and gave the traditional Easter greeting: *'Christ is risen!'* 

Back with a deafening roar came the traditional reply: 'He is risen indeed!'





"Much of the Bible, in particular the historical books of the old testament, are as accurate historical documents as any that we have from antiquity and are in fact more accurate than many of the Egyptian, Mesopotamian, or <u>Greek</u> histories. These Biblical records can be and are used as are other ancient documents in archeological work. For the most part, historical events described took place and the peoples cited really existed. This is not to say that names of all peoples and places mentioned can be identified today, or that every event as reported in the historical books happened exactly as stated."



# Knit for Peace Calling all knitters!








